As we reflect on 20 years serving children and families, we have seen considerable growth and change, but one prevailing theme has remained consistent: our focus on Keeping Families Together. While a number of new programs have been added to our service offerings, we continue to pride ourselves on providing innovative family focused quality care. Each program, while unique in their own way, ensures the needs of our families are met and the highest standards of quality are delivered whenever and wherever possible.

No Longer Just Kids and Oneida County

As the array of services has evolved at KO, we recognize that our name may now be a bit deceiving. Today, we proudly offer **15** programs across six counties in the Mohawk Valley serving **1,100** families every day. Over half of the identified clients we serve are actually adults. As a result we have begun necessary steps to rebrand the organization. In 2018 we look forward to unveiling details on a new name and fresh look for Kids Oneida.

Bringing Our Communities Together Collaboratively

Collaboration is one of the cornerstones that Kids Oneida was founded on. Today, collaboration is more important than ever as we face unprecedented system changes in New York State. In 2017, we launched a restructured subcontracted provider network: Integrated Community Alternatives Network Independent Practice Association (ICAN IPA). With this model, we are leading the way through collaboration with 40+ behavioral health organizations as one of the first behavioral health Independent Practice Associations in the state. In November 2017, we announced a new management relationship with the Utica Children's Museum as a means to preserve a 55 year old asset in our community. This collaborative endeavor highlights our commitment not only to diversify our offerings but also to finding sustainable solutions that have a significant collective impact in the Mohawk Valley for all families. We continue to evaluate ways in which our services can help those individual families we work with every day as well as ways in which our philosophy of care can have a profound impact rooted in collaboration.

The directors' role is essentially twofold and they are organizationally positioned in the agency to concentrate their focus on both a macro level as well as programmatic level.





At the Beginning...

Twenty years ago, families had little choice. If their child was at risk, or had social, emotional or behavioral challenges, institutional care was often the only solution available. Such care, without individualized attention or a holistic, proactive approach, could leave damaging effects on children, disrupt or destroy family dynamics and cause long term issues. Kids Oneida was created to be an agent of change.

DISRUPTING THE NORM

Realizing the rampant institutionalization of youth in out-of-home care sometimes being the only choice for families in crisis, Kids Oneida set out to be an ally for kids and families. Since our inception, we have helped shift the landscape of children's services across Central New York and the state to recognize the value and importance of keeping families together. The approach was different and bold, and all eyes were on us.

HUMBLE BEGINNINGS

Kids Oneida was created as a demonstration project that was intended to be a short-term pilot in Oneida County. We were established with support from state, county, and local leaders across child-serving systems and were selected by the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation as one of 12 models across the country to test a new approach to children's mental health service delivery. We began with just two staff members running one program.

EARLY GROWTH

Things took off. The programs grew, the approach worked, our team increased and people took notice. Our youth demonstrated reduced symptoms, less severe risk behaviors and improved functioning. We were recognized by The New York State Office of Mental Health, Mt. Sinai Hospital, The Florida Mental Health Institute, The National Building Bridges Initiative, The White House Council for Community Solutions and many more for our groundbreaking and impactful work.

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While much has changed at Kids Oneida over the last 20 years, our core philosophy never wavers. Our growth has been responsive and strategic. We have expanded what we do, where we do it, and who we reach, but our approach—how we do our work—has and will always be centered on each person that we get to support.

EMPOWERING YOUTH, FAMILIES, AND ADULTS

We believe in the power and strength of every person who is in the Kids Oneida family. For 20 years, it has been our job to help children and families rediscover their own ability to thrive in our community. Client voice and choice is a central component to our Wraparound Approach that ensures all programs, services, and interactions are driven by the interests, strengths, and needs of those we work with. Kids Oneida has been recognized as a model for our innovative and effective approach to treatment and has received local, state, and national accolades.

STRENGTHENING OUR COMMUNITY

Kids Oneida is grounded in the daily life experiences of youth and families. We are in schools, at clients' homes and in the community so that we can understand and better address the challenges we face. After recognizing that many issues we were designed to address exist across the Mohawk Valley, we expanded our community.

INNOVATING AND EVOLVING

Kids Oneida has evolved into 15 initiatives led by over 300 staff and providers across the Mohawk Valley. With a network of intensive, community-based support available 24/7, today's Kids Oneida ensures that children and families get what they need to heal from trauma, address and overcome challenges, and strengthen their families and communities. We are committed to continuous advancement and improvement across our agency. Every day, we face changing needs and challenges with our clients, in our agency and in our community. As an adaptive, flexible organization, we are able to adjust to what is needed in each moment to strengthen and restore families and our community.

Our Programs

Financials

Intensive Kids Oneida (IKO) + Assertive Community Treatment (ACT) + Step Down

A true residential alternative, these are the most intensive programs we offer with the ability to provide wraparound services at three different levels of intensity as youth build their strengths and resources.

Parent Partner Program

To enhance team efforts and empower families to meet their goals effectively, Parent Partners work as part of an interdisciplinary team to provide support and advocacy for those enrolled in our Kids Oneida/ACT program.

Return Home Early (RHE)

To reunite families, improve outcomes, and promote public safety, RHE identifies and supports youth in residential placement to transition home prior to their scheduled release date with the most effective supports in place.

School-Based Services

We partner with schools and districts to bring tailored services to classrooms, schools and students' homes. We improve attendance and academic achievement, reduce disciplinary referrals, and prevent children's placement in residential facilities based on academic needs.

Second Chance Juvenile Reentry

To transform the Mohawk Valley's juvenile justice system, we support county-level task forces working to reduce youth recidivism, improve family engagement, address racial and ethnic disparities, and increase trauma-informed care.

Service Provisions for Individualized Needs (SPIN)

SPIN offers fee-for-service supports for clients based on their unique needs and interests that can be provided at home, in school, and in the community. We became one of the first agencies in Upstate New York to provide Home and Community Based Services (HCBS) to the region which are administered through the ICAN IPA Network.

Kids Herkimer

Since being launched in 2008, Kids Herkimer has expanded to offer six programs for Herkimer County's youth and families: Intensive Preventive, SPIN, Family Reunification, Detention Diversion, RHE, and the Nurturing Parenting Program.

Healthy Families of Herkimer County

This nationally validated program is proven to promote positive parenting skills and is available to new and expecting parents across the county through a partnership with Herkimer County Public Health Department.

Adult Health Homes

This program provides NYS Adult Medicaid recipients with comprehensive Care Management in an effort to support overall improvement in physical health and emotional well-being.

Kids Otsego

We provide a comprehensive array of services and supports in Otsego county across multiple systems such as school districts, probation and Department of Social Services.

Healthy Families of Oneida County

With support from NYS Office of Children and Family Services, this program provides child development and parenting education, assessments of infant-child development, and access to resources for new parents and their children up to age five.

Evelyn's House

Transitional housing for homeless mothers ages 16-21 and their children, Evelyn's House provides a safe, nurturing home and supportive services while preparing young mothers for the challenges of living independently.

Nurturing Parenting Program

This evidence-based parenting curriculum and training is provided to parents in a respectful and empowering environment. Supervised Visitation allows separated families the ability to maintain or reestablish relationships in a safe setting.


Children's Health Homes

To address and support medical, behavioral and emotional health issues through connection to resources and appropriate services, this program provides comprehensive Care Management to Medicaid eligible children from birth to age 21.


TBI/NHTD Waiver

New to Kids Oneida in July 2017, the Traumatic Brain Injury and Nursing Home Transition and Diversion Waiver Services provide individuals with supports in their home and community as an alternative to Nursing Home Care.

2017 Revenue by Source*




2017 Expenses by Category*

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Looking Forward to 2018

Strategic Growth & Transformative Support

Launching New Initiatives & Collaborations

Kids Oneida is bringing new, innovative supports to our community.

Through our new relationship with the **Utica Children's Museum**, we will be strengthening programming, streamlining operations, and ensuring the financial sustainability of this community asset. We hope to create a brand new future for the museum as the perfect place to learn and play in the Mohawk Valley!

We are launching a rapid re-housing program called **Project HOME (Housing Opportunities to Motivate and Empower).** The primary goals are to enable homeless, transitional age youth (18-24) to obtain and remain in safe and affordable permanent housing, increase their skills and/or income, and achieve greater self-determination and independence.

Evelyn's House, a transitional shelter for young, homeless women who are pregnant and/or parenting, will also begin providing Rapid Rehousing Services. Using a Housing First Model, we plan to support our residents through intensive case management, supportive services, and rental assistance to help them successfully transition to and remain in permanent housing.





Kids Oneida will continue to lead the way and innovate through the transition of behavioral health services to **Medicaid Managed Care** – more specifically through adult focused health home care management and Home and Community Based Services (HCBS) funded by Medicaid Managed Care Organizations (i.e. Fidelis, Excellus and United). We will further strengthen our Independent Practice Association (IPA) so that we can remain as a leader in the state and region in navigating and supporting others through these unprecedented health care system reforms.



Strengthening our Message & Raising Awareness

Kids Oneida is lifting our voice and sharing what we do with you.

To better communicate who we are and what we do, Kids Oneida will engage in a **strategic rebrand of our organization** in 2018. Today we reach more people than just "kids" and extend well beyond "Oneida" County. After 20 years of growth, we now provide supports to individuals and families prenatally through end of life in seven counties and counting. This exciting rebranding endeavor will allow us to forge ahead with a brand name and brand mark that will clearly capture and communicate the depth and breadth of services and supports that we provide to those in this region. We spent a good portion of 2017 internally defining and clarifying who we are, what we do and who we serve. We look forward to unveiling our new brand in 2018 and sharing with our clients, partners, supporters and community. Stay tuned!

Building Sustainable Fiscal Supports

Kids Oneida is making sure we will be here for the long haul.

Continuing our trend of decreasing reliance on any one funding source, Kids Oneida will further diversify revenue streams to include government grants and contracts from federal, state, county, and city agencies, foundation grants, individual contributions, and earned income. To effectively and efficiently manage our financial systems, Kids Oneida will create new tracking systems across programs to help monitor financial benchmarks for all programs across the agency. We will also identify and pursue new investment opportunities to expand our impact across the community.
